

## **2014 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES**

## January 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2014 Kettunen Center – Tustin, MI

- I. MAA President Dan Vogler opened the meeting at 9:00 am welcoming all attendees to our 27<sup>th</sup> annual meeting (32 total; attendance down due to weather).
  - 1) Meeting sponsors were recognized and thanked for their contributions.
  - 2) Sponsors for this year included: Easy Pro Pond Products, Zeigler/Thornapple Feeds, Applied Biochemists, GreenStone Farm Credit Services, Pentair-Aquatic Ecosystems and Troutlodge.
  - 3) Total sponsor donations of \$1,200.
- II. Business Meeting.
  - 1) Proof of notice of the 2014 meeting and reading/disposal of the 2013 annual meeting minutes and 2013 Board meeting minutes.
    - i. Motion by Russ A., seconded by John N., motion carried.
  - 2) President's report
    - i. Strategic Plan For A Thriving and Sustainable Michigan Aquaculture Sector.
    - ii. Check-off program.
  - 3) Introduction of current MAA board members and officers.
  - 4) Treasurer's Report (Dave L.).
    - i. Current MAA treasury balance of \$ 4,619.52.
    - ii. Motion to accept by Bob B.; seconded by Tom W.; motion carried.
    - iii. Note: new total of \$ 5,464.52 when adding in additional membership dues collected during registration.
  - 5) MAA Board Elections:
    - i. Up for election were the positions of President (Dan Vogler incum.) and 1 Board seat (Jerry Kahn incum.).
    - ii. Motion made by Tom W. to dispense with the vote since the incumbents are running unopposed; seconded by Rick W.; motion carried.
  - 6) Individual introductions by all meeting attendees.
  - 7) Mention of the upcoming meeting in Toledo, OH February 22-23, 2014.
    - i. "2014 North Central Aquaculture Conference".
    - ii. MAA, IAA, OAA, NCRAC.

- IV. The State of Michigan Aquaculture (Dr. Steve Halstead MDARD):
  - 1) Avoiding inter-agency friction between the 3 QOL agencies (Quality Of Life)
    - i. MDARD, MDNR, MDEQ.
    - ii. Much improved over the past 2 years with the round table meetings.
    - iii. Checklist of regulatory steps by each agency:
      - 1. Before: no knowledge of the other agencies steps.
      - 2. Now: a clearer step-by-step process for the aquaculture industry.
    - iv. The MDARD is eager to see implementation of the Strategic Aquaculture Plan.
  - 2) Steve fielded a variety of questions from attendees.
    - i. MI Right To Farm Act ... siting GAMMPs (zoning issues with urban aquaculture).
    - ii. Defining large vs small farms in relation to aquaculture.
    - iii. MAEAP
    - iv. Farmstead verification issues ... too many question marks when considering aquaculture (facility variety).
  - 3) Joe Colyn (Originz)
    - i. Joe presented the executive summary of the Strategic Plan For A Thriving and Sustainable Michigan Aquaculture Sector.
    - ii. To be in the website soon (www.michiganaquacutlure.org).
    - iii. Potential of \$1 billion annually by the year 2025.
    - iv. The plan outlines 7 key objectives with 7 initial strategic actions to achieve the objectives; beginning this year.
    - v. The potential of Great Lakes net pen farming (cage culture) and recirculating system aquaculture (RAS).
      - 1. Cage culture will certainly face permitting and regulatory obstacles and meet resistance from public and environmental groups.
      - 2. Too many negatives still associated with "aquaculture" (bad press; misinformation, etc.).

## V. Lunch

- VI. Updates from the QOL agencies:
  - 1) Dr. Nancy Frank (MDARD)
    - i. 63 registered fish facilities in 2013, up 5 from 2012.
    - ii. MDARD conducted 20+ site visits last year.
    - iii. 2014: continue with the MI-EDC and resume talks with an Aquaculture Advisory Group.
    - iv. Nancy asked the group: "How can we (the fish health and regulatory sides) do things differently ?
  - 2) Ed Eisch (MDNR)
    - i. New hunting and fishing license fee structure in place to simplify the process and generate greater revenues for the DNR.
    - ii. New fisheries division strategic plan (5 goals; available at: <u>www.michigandnr.com/PUBLICATIONS/PDFS/Fishing/2013-17-FD-StrategicPlan-April22-WEB.pdf</u>
    - iii. Updates on 2013 salmon and musky spawning programs.
    - iv. Chris W. asked about co-op stocking agreements between the state and private producers. Ed replied that, other than some work with Tribes, nothing is in place.

- 3) Dave Fiedler (MDEQ)
  - i. Dave stated that the Director of the MDEQ <u>wants</u> a robust MI aquaculture sector, but risk <u>must</u> be managed (permitting).
  - ii. Dave stressed the importance and value of a well-written permit, both to the state, the public, the environment, and the permittee.
  - iii. The DEQ realizes: (1) the current permitting process needs streamlining and faster turn-around, (2) much of the rules and regs are difficult to interpret, and (3) compliance assistance needs to improve.
  - iv. A general permit for aquaculture facilities is difficult because of the uniqueness of each facility ... but the possibility of a general permit will be investigated.
- VII. A US Aquaculture Check Off Program (Dan Vogler)
  - 1) The need is spurred by the increasing global demand for seafood.
  - 2) 91% of seafood consumed in the US is imported; a \$12 billion deficit.
  - 3) The US contribution to global aquaculture products is 1% (about \$1 billion).
  - 4) Our future depends on the social acceptance of aquaculture and investments into aquaculture.
  - 5) A check off program:
    - i. Would be mandatory once established.
    - ii. Would be used only for promotion and education
    - iii. Would have the funds directed by an elected board.
    - iv. Would be created by either the USDA or Congress.
    - v. The assessment would best be based on a % of gross revenue at the first point of sale.
    - vi. There will be exclusions to this assessment.
    - vii. Chris W questioned if aquaculture industry suppliers could be included in the assessment = unknown if "legal" to do so.
    - viii. Kent H. stated that a different objective or reason for a check off may be better.
      - 1. Such as promoting healthier nutrition by increasing the per capita consumption of seafood in the US (vs. using the increase of US farmed seafood products).
      - ix. Dan will be presenting this idea at a number of upcoming meetings, including the US-WAS meeting in Seattle.
- VIII. Aquaculture Media Relations Primer (Chris Weeks and Dan Vogler)
  - 1) The need for a <u>unified</u> media message from the MAA
  - 2) The group was given a hand-out detailing Media Talking Points.
    - i. Current US and global seafood production statistics.
    - ii. Michigan's unique potential and opportunities, etc.
    - iii. All members were urged to consistently use this information for promotion of the aquaculture plan in MI and the US.
  - IX. Building A Stronger Aquaculture Association (Chris Weeks and Kent Herrick).
    - 1) The need for a stronger, larger, more active aquaculture trade association.
      - i. More participation from more members, not just the historic few.
        - ii. What's happened to the MAA committees ?
          - 1. Discussion of the need for committees and that we did not follow through with what was discussed at last year's meeting.
          - 2. Dan V mentioned that the 2 hour MAA session at the Toledo meeting in February would be an opportune time to address committee needs.
  - X. The meeting adjourned at 4:10 pm.
